SUPPORT CONTINUOUS HEALTH COVERAGE FOR KIDS



CONTINUOUS ELIGIBILITY IMPROVES OUTCOMES, LOWERS COSTS & HELPS FAMILIES

Continuous eligibility (CE) requires states to cover children in CHIP and Medicaid for a defined period of time without interruption, regardless of changes in circumstances.

Consistent health coverage is critical to children's development and well-being, especially in their early years, allowing them to grow into healthy, productive adults.

<u>Positive effects</u> of health coverage include early detection of conditions through routine and comprehensive care, less chronic disease in adulthood, increased graduation rates, and reductions in mortality, emergency care usage, and avoidable hospitalizations.

<u>According to the CBO</u>, an additional year of childhood coverage would improve labor outcomes in adulthood (higher future earnings and more productivity), which increases the return on investment, boosts the GDP, and has positive long-term fiscal effects.

Not only does CE improve short- and long-term health outcomes, it reduces churn and financial barriers to care, promotes health equity and lowers costs.

WHAT'S HAPPENING NOW?

There are <u>38 million children</u> enrolled in Medicaid and CHIP nationally. During the Medicaid "unwinding," nearly <u>5 million children</u> lost their health coverage, a 10% national decline. Many were disenrolled due to procedural or administrative reasons like missing paperwork, not because they were no longer eligible. Nearly <u>600,000 kids</u> lost coverage in Florida.

Through the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023, Congress <u>enacted</u> a 12-month CE period for children under age 19 in Medicaid and CHIP beginning on January 1, 2024. This new policy will benefit <u>more than 17 million eligible children</u> in states that didn't previously have a 12-month CE policy. **But we can do better.**

KEEP KIDS COVERED ACT

Representatives Kathy Castor (FL-14) and Yadira Caraveo (CO-08) lead the <u>Keep Kids Covered Act</u>, a bill to provide multi-year CE for eligible children in Medicaid and CHIP until age 6, with 24-month CE for eligible children until age 19.

The effort is supported by leading child and family health advocacy <u>organizations</u>, and the Biden-Harris Administration has proposed a similar effort.
